



Hawai'i Department of Education Title I Parent and Family Engagement Policy

In support of strengthening student academic achievement, each local educational agency that receives Title I, Part A funds must develop jointly with, agree on with, and distribute to parents of participating children a written parent and family engagement policy that contains information required by section 1116(a)(2) of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA).

This policy establishes the Hawai'i State Department of Education's (Department) expectations for parent and family engagement and describes how it will implement specific activities.

1. Involvement

- A. The Department will involve participating Title I parents in the joint development of its State parent and family engagement policy through its Title I Parent Advisory Committee (TPAC).

2. Plan Development

- B. Parents and family members are given the opportunity to provide meaningful feedback on the development of the State Strategic Plan through feedback surveys and community meetings.
- C. Parents and family members are involved in developing Three-Year Success Maps and Academic Plans through School Community Councils at each school.

3. State Support

- D. The Family Community Engagement Professional Learning Community (FCE PLC) provides technical support and training to help Title I schools plan and implement effective parent and family engagement activities.
- E. The Department will establish a position within the Community Engagement Branch to oversee and lead parent and family engagement work in partnership with the School Transformation Branch, other pertinent departments, and community stakeholder groups. In addition, the position will lead the design and dissemination of evidence-based strategies to improve parent and family engagement.

4. Feedback and Evaluation

- F. The Department receives feedback from families through the School Quality Survey, which is conducted at the state level by the Assessment and Accountability Branch. Parents from every school are invited to participate and provide feedback.
- G. One of the FCE PLC goals is to develop an annual evaluation specifically focused on the content and effectiveness of this parent and family engagement policy in improving the academic quality of its Title I, Part A schools. The Department will use the evaluation's findings of its parent and family engagement policy and activities to design evidence-based strategies for more effective parent and family engagement and, if necessary, revise its parent and family engagement policy with parent involvement.

5. How Schools Work With Parents

- H. Parents are assisted in understanding the requirements of Title I, Part A through the Annual Title I Meeting at each Title I school. Title I schools are provided with sample meeting resources.
- I. The Department provides, as appropriate, assistance to parents of children served by its schools in understanding the State's challenging academic standards and State and local academic assessments, including alternate assessments, through the SBA Flyer for Families, which may be distributed to families and is shared with Title I Linker Resource Teachers¹ and Title I Schools.
- J. Title I schools document how they assist parents in monitoring their child's progress and how they work with educators.
- K. Title I Linker Resource Teachers are trained to support schools as needed, based on data and evidence.

6. Training and Support

- L. Title I schools provide evidence that they have provided materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve their academic achievement, such as literacy training and, as appropriate, the use of technology to foster parent and family engagement.
- M. Title I schools provide evidence that their teachers, specialized instructional support personnel, principals, other school leaders, and other staff have been educated in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to implement and coordinate parent programs and build ties between parents and schools.
- N. Hawai'i State Family Engagement Center (HFEC) offers resources for families. Parents at Title I schools are informed of HFEC during Annual Title I meetings and on the Department's website.
- O. The FCE PLC, in partnership with the Hawai'i Afterschool Alliance, provides training to school- and complex-area participants.
- P. Title I Linker Resource Teachers receive training and resources to support schools.

¹ A Title I Linker Resource Teacher is provided to each complex area and the Hawai'i State Public Charter School Commission to support Title I Schools.

7. Coordination

- Q. The Department will coordinate and integrate parent and family engagement strategies in Title I, Part A, with parent and family engagement strategies of the following other relevant Federal, State, and local programs:

- R. The Department coordinates with various organizations and programs to provide opportunities, including transition centers, family engagement conferences, trainings, school walk-throughs, and support for full-service community schools.
- S. Title I schools provide evidence that they have, to the extent feasible and appropriate, coordinated and integrated parent and family engagement programs and activities with other relevant Federal, State, and local programs, and conduct other activities, such as parent resource centers, that encourage and support parents in more fully participating in the education of their children.
- T. Starting in SY 2026-2027, parents and families are informed of the Hawai'i State Family Engagement Center program under Title IV, Part E of the ESEA through the Annual Title I Meeting and resources provided on the Department website.

8. Accessibility

- U. Title I schools document that information related to the school and parent programs, meetings, and other activities are sent to the parents of participating children in an understandable and uniform format, including alternative formats upon request, and, to the extent practicable, in a language the parents can understand.
- V. Title I Linker Resource Teachers receive resources that are shared with complex areas and schools.
- W. The FCE PLC shares language resources and training opportunities with participants at the complex area and school levels.

ADOPTION

This Hawai'i Department of Education Parent and Family Engagement Policy has been developed jointly with, and agreed on with, parents and families of children participating in Title I, Part A programs, as evidenced by the TPAC meeting agenda, notes, and attendance records.

This policy was adopted by the Hawai'i Department of Education on March 17, 2026. The policy will be in effect starting SY 2026-2027 and will be revised annually or as needed. The Department will distribute this policy to all parents of participating Title I, Part A children by October 2, 2026, and annually thereafter.
